Kyrgyz Alliance for Water and Sanitation (KAWS)

KAWS is a network organization of 46 Community Drinking Water Users Unions CDWUUs established in 2008

- KAWS focus is on raising awareness for safe water and sustainable sanitation in rural areas
- KAWS is the member of National Water Police Dialog and actively cooperating with the national and regional state
- KAWS is the member of WECF network





BACKGROUND TO THE RURAL WATER SUPPLY AND SANITATION PROJECT IN KYRGYZSTAN

The Problem:

- since the end of the Soviet Union in 1991, the Kyrgyz government has lacked resources to provide this service. Many villages have had no clean drinking water for 15 years
- Is there an alternative? Can rural people and their communities address their lack of safe drinking water and manage its provision themselves?
- Rural Kyrgyzstan is a generally traditional and male dominated society mainly in the southern part of the country

However, women make up over half the population they are also the ones most affected by the presence or absence of clean drinking water

- -> The Rural Water Supply Sanitation Project
- Worked with 200 villages in 3 northern Kyrgyzstan to re-habilitated their water supply and sanitation systems between 2002-2008
- Financial and technical assistance provided by DFID and the World Bank.
- local Community Development Team, recruited from NGOs to implement awareness raising, community mobilization, training etc

Typical Situation in Rural Areas: deteriorated rural drinking water supply - broken pumps unsafe water quality – pit latrines







The Approach

- Participation and Involvement of local People are Basic Principles which are Relevant to Improving Local Governance and Citizens Use of Public Resources
- Awareness raising was done in workshops with 3 groups of people: the men, women and young people. These were done separately to ensure as wide a participation as possible and also to ensure different voices (especially those of women) could be heard





Ways in which women's participation is encouraged

Participatory Community Appraisal is done separately with the women to ensure their voices are heard
Women encouraged to be involved in the Community Mobilisation
Women encouraged to be elected to the CDWUU Board
Insisting that half of the Tap Stand Committee members are female

Exposure visits to villages with female CDWUU Chair





Community Self Monitoring of Sustainability

Participatory Self Monitoring including men, women and all stakeholder:

- > Increased sense of ownership
- > Higher financial sustainability (increased tariff payment, 95% pay the water tariff)
- > Improved governance
- > Technical sustainability
- > Accountability



Effective Learning and Networking

- Kyrgyz Alliance for Water and Sanitation found that peer learning is a simple, powerful and successful way for rural people
- Encouraged exchange and inter exchange visits between communities and CDWUUs and also building structures for continuous learning and development
- It is vital that networks are initiated by the CDWUUs themselves and not imposed top-down

Going beyond water supply: Providing sustainable solutions for improved living conditions

- > sanitation (ecosan)
- ➤ Energy (stoves and solar collectors)
- ➤ Food security





















Sustainability and Up-Scaling of Safe Water and Sustainable Sanitation

- Local capacity in the villages through training facilitators who instruct local staff on the construction and maintenance of the respective technologies - with local staff and expertise and local construction materials
- CDWUU's Demonstration and Resource Centers
- Working with local school children and women groups developing set of Environmental Joint Action Plans to raise awareness and demand for environmental technologies
- Social financing mechanisms making the technologies affordable and suitable for local communities
